Dear People of God:

I've been thinking quite a bit about the above quote from Thomas Merton. I'll admit to being fairly far removed from the "hustle and bustle" that fills the days before Christmas for so many people. I'll also admit I've learned no amount of pleading or cajoling from the priest will help folks slow down (calendars just don't work that way). We live in a culture in which commitments are squeezed into every available time slot.

This is why the Merton quote is so startling. Christ comes into our world and our lives even when we don't make room for him! The Incarnate love of God will not be thwarted — even by our perceived busyness. Maybe the task of Advent isn't to "make space" for God's love as much as it is to realize God's love is among us already, and to recognize that Divine Love whenever, wherever and however it appears.

People often comment to me in the days leading up to

Christmas about this time of year being "my busy season." I usually respond with some version of, "it's a different sort of busy, because Advent and Christmas are seasons of opportunity for folks to reconnect with the reason we Christians

celebrate the Birth of Christ in the first place."

My prayer for all of you is that as you make your way through these coming days, you will catch glimpses of God's grace in the midst of the "hustle and bustle." I encourage you to use the following prayer in your daily devotions between now and Christmas Day:

Purify our conscience, Almighty God, by your daily visitation, that your Son Jesus Christ, at his coming, may find in us a mansion prepared for himself; who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen. (Collect for the Fourth Sunday of Advent)




Friday Family Fellowship


Walking In Wonder — A Pre-Advent Quiet Day

It occurred to her that the conflicts in the Middle East include so many knots—the

knot of injustice, the knot of separation, the knot of confusion, and so many more. "Conflict doesn't only occur in the Middle East;" Fenelon writes, "it occurs in our personal lives as well, and even at our dinner tables."

Come join us as we explore some of these knots during this season of searching for peace, both on the global stage and personally. We'll pray to let go of these knots, to turn ourselves over to Christ through his mother.


BLANKET MINISTRY

*If possible, please pay your remaining 2023 pledge before year end. The 2023 Contribution Statements will be sent out the last week of January 2024.

*To be sure any year-end contributions are credited for 2023 tax purposes, the contribution must be at the church no later than Sunday, December 31, 2023. If no one is in the office, just drop the contribution through the mail slot. The mail slot is located east of the parking lot doors. As we have been hearing in the news and many of us know from our own experience with family and friends, addiction takes a devastating toll on health, healthy relationships and livelihoods. Meta House has been a residential treatment center for women since 1963. Watch for gift tags for the women and their children in residence to be posted on the library windows on December 3. includes diapers various sizes, baby bottles, 2024 planners, journals and gratitude journals, crafting kits, coloring and activity books, gel pens, markers, slippers and slides, nail polish, hairbrushes, combs, blow dryers, plugin headphones, kids toys for 12 and under, board games, puzzles and playing cards. All items must be new, unused, and unopened.

Sacred Spaces

The Indigenous People of the American Southwest built and continue to build, a sacred space called a Kiva. It is usually an underground chamber, covered with wooden beams with an opening in the center of the roof. The Kiva is entered and exited by means of a Kiva ladder. Inside you're in darkness. When your eyes adjust, you seen the pinpoint of light in the roof. It is a sacred space. A kiva is a space used by Pueblo dwellers for rites and political meetings, many of them associated with the kachina belief system. Among the modern Hopi and most other Pueblo peoples, "kiva" means a large room that is circular and underground, and used for spiritual ceremonies. During my time living in New Mexico, I visited the great Kiva of Chaco Canyon – truly a wonder of the ancient world. <u>https://newmexiconomad.com/chaco-canyon-national-historical-park/</u>



<u>The Ladder to the Light</u> by Steven Charleston shows us a way to climb the ladder in the kiva as a mediation on aspects of our spiritual lives. Each rung of the ladder is given a chapter on our spiritual lives. The bottom rung is Faith. This is followed by Blessing Hope, Community, Action, Truth, Renewal, Transformation and finally the emergence into the light.

Steven Charleston is an indigenous elder of the Choctaw nation and a retired Episcopal

Bishop. Rev. Michael Curry says about *The Ladder to Light*: "Here is wisdom born out of a lifetime of listening faithfully to the voice of God. Here is wisdom we need for the living of these days."

This book (of his many) has helped me on my own spiritual journey. He intersperses his wisdom with his daily messages he receives during his morning prayer ritual. He shares these messages on Facebook! The journey through the Kiva provides wonderful imagery and guidance. I hope you will look at his works and become a follower of him on the 'Book of Faces'. There will be a copy in Trinity's library soon.

Here is one of his FB posts:

"I am getting too old for some things. For example, I am too old to hate. I have been around long enough to learn that we are all human beings. We are different, not better. Hating others is only a form of hating yourself. I am too old to despair for I have seen the tides of life rise and fall; I am too old to be uninvolved because I know how little time we have to love; I am too old to blame for I know how often I have been mistaken myself. I am too old for some things, but caring is not one of them."

The Anit-Racist Study Group is exactly that. We study our current situation regarding discrimination, hate speech and other social issues we see today. We look at history of racism in American and in the Episcopal Church – with film, with books, with field trips and conversation. We are not exclusively a book group. We are hoping to share what we learn to help make our community a better place. All are welcome to check out books we have added to Trinity's library or join us for our monthly meeting. We will not have a meeting in December. \sim *Betsy Jeffery*

together on a regular but informal basis

for purely social reasons – to enjoy one another's company, to strengthen bonds of community, to meet new members and just to get to know other people who share a common interest in Grace but with whom we might not otherwise interact. They provide a means to develop new friendships and deepen old ones and are a way to make our parish feel smaller and warmer.

There is no agenda or plan – just casual fellowship and a refreshing meal. Groups are made up of singles, couples, young people, retired folks, etc., in other words a cross section of the parish. Out of the meetings, friendships develop among people who might not have any other opportunity to meet and get to know each other.

Newcomers are especially invited to join one of the groups at any time. Each small group of eight to twelve people will meet beginning in the new year, in the home of one of the members of the group. Generally, the host provides the main course while the other members fill in the rest of the meal such as appetizer, bread, salad, veggies, dessert, etc. Some groups have enjoyed gathering for a picnic lunch during good weather or even meeting at a local restaurant. Some groups have elected to study and discuss certain books, or incorporate an evening devotional into the gathering, while others gather for a purely social experience. The choice of available options is limited only by the collective imagination of the group, but the

main idea is for the gatherings to simply focus on Christian fellowship, a refreshing meal and relaxed conversation.

The groups are put together randomly in order to add an element of spontaneity, such that each of us might have the opportunity to get to know others in the parish who may be outside our normal circle of acquaintance. In other words, this is a great way to meet and get to know those you might not have a chance to visit with otherwise.
