Reflections on Black History Month

WHO KNEW?



• 1895 Frederick Douglas, social reformer, abolitionist, statesman, supporter of women's suffrage, and the most powerful civil rights advocate of his era, dies.

• 1897 The school board for the Washington area "colored schools" agrees to set aside the afternoon of 2/14 to learn about his life, writings, and speeches.

- 1915 on the 50th anniversary of the emancipation, Dr, Carter Woodson is inspired to honor Black history; starts an association for the study of African American Life
- 1932 Woodson and colleagues provide a K-12 Teaching curriculum. Some white schools participate; Woodson notes that this had improved race relations.
- February 1926 Dr. Woodson announces the first Negro History week, chosen because it was the month in which both Lincoln and Frederick Douglas were born.
- 1970 Negro history week, then month, becomes Black history Month and black college students push for more opportunities to study Black History
- 1976 President Gerald Ford Supports Black History Month as an important element of the nation's bicentennial proclaiming: "...we can seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans throughout our history."
- Every president since Ronald Regan has issued a Black History Month Proclamation

2021 President Biden: "...because the soul of our nation will be troubled as long as systemic racism is allowed to persist" "We are not just morally deprived because of it, we are also less prosperous, less successful, and less secure as a Nation."

I admit I had no idea February had this designation for nearly a century. There is so much I don't know about Black history because it was not taught in my schools. Until recently, I have not made much of an effort to educate myself.

After taking part in a Black Lives Matter march following the murder of George Floyd, I determined it was time to get to work. Since I have begun this journey, I have been astounded, inspired, frustrated, humbled, ashamed, and challenged by what I have learned. As I began learning about some of the atrocities inflicted upon our Black and brown brothers and sisters over centuries, I often felt, hopeless, haunted, and horrified. How could I have been blinded to so much of this part of our country's history?

That's a complicated question with myriad answers. That is why this work has taken on such importance to me, and to others interested in following this path to see where it might lead.

Please join us when you can, however you care to. Here are some possibilities to consider:

- Lively conversation/book discussions take place in the library from 6:30-8:00 on the second and fourth Mondays of each month.
- Watch the Tidings for news of social, educational, or enrichment opportunities.
- Borrow a book from the BIPOC (Black Indigenous People of Color) shelves in the Trinity Library.
- Donate to that library books which you have read or suggest them for us to purchase.

Ask to be put on our mailing list - no obligations, just to be kept up to date on opportunities as they arise by sending your contact information to <u>bjeffery06@gmail.com</u>

Read or write a "book report" on a book you liked or didn't like on an index cared and leave it with others in the library.

Our group is asking for donations to purchase books to fill the BIPOC Shelves. You can either purchase a book yourself and donate it or you may use Vanco to donate to our cause – there is a BIPOC Books category available. If you need a suggestion for a book, just ask! We'll be sharing a reading list of books we would like to anyone that wants one.

Frederick Douglas said, "knowledge is the pathway from slavery to freedom." I read this both literally and figuratively.



Turkey and Syria Earthquake Relief During Lent

This year for Lent, instead of a collection of items, the Outreach Committee urges you to consider supporting once again Episcopal Relief and Development and additionally Doctors Without Borders in their efforts to assist survivors of the devastating 7.8-magnitude earthquake, which struck southeast Turkey and northern Syria. The reported death toll stands at approximately 47,000 and thousands are left homeless, hospitalized and in need of food and medicine. Episcopal Relief and Development is working with local partners to provide relief and support while Doctors Without Borders is providing medical care. At the end of Lent, whatever funds are collected will be split evenly between the two organizations.
