Introducing Our Interim Music Minister

Curt Sather, a Wisconsin native, began music lessons on the



accordion at age 7, and studied organ at Carroll College with Phyllis Stringham and James Burmeister before earning a BM in Organ Performance at Arizona State University studying with Robert Clark, and MM and DMA degrees from The Eastman School of Music, Rochester NY, studying organ with Russell Saunders. Additional organ studies were with Catharine Crozier and David Craighead, as well as harpsichord with John Metz and Arthur Haas.

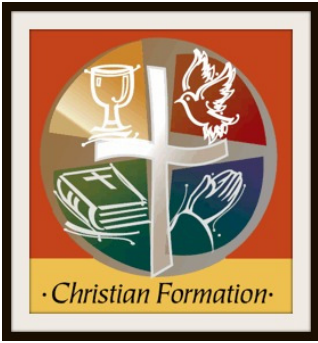
Regular church jobs began at age 11, continued with 13 years as Organist and Choirmaster at St. Barnabas on the Desert Episcopal Church, Scottsdale AZ, four years at the historic Benedictine monastery of San Miniato al Monte, Florence, Italy (in addition to serving as music director of the Anglican Church of Florence, as one of the organists in the Duomo (Cathedral)), churches in Brixton (London), Phoenix AZ, Los Angeles CA, Olympia WA, Delhi NY, and now at Trinity Episcopal Church, Wauwatosa.

Recitals, both as soloist and accompanist on organ, piano, and harpsichord, and concerts with choirs and instrumental groups have spanned the United States, Mexico, Europe, New Zealand and Australia; CDs have been recorded in Arizona, Washington, and Italy; and the complete organ works of J. S. Bach have been performed four times: twice as 14-week series of recitals (1996 & 2005), and twice as 24-hour marathons to celebrate the composer's birthday (2006 & 2017).

Hobbies include traveling, especially to visit museums and attend opera performances around the world, including a pair of 4-month round-the-world trips on a small ship, three times walking the 500 mile historic pilgrimage (Camino de Santiago de Compostela) across northern Spain, and twice to the Wagner opera festival in Bayreuth, Germany. Any spare time is filled with the study of Quranic Arabic.

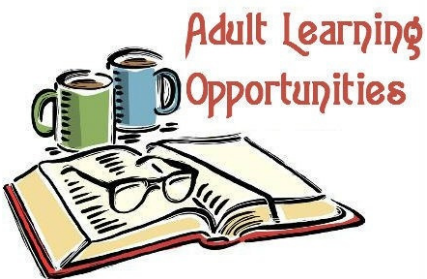

In the past year we have gone to having a theme each month. The theme is always optional, but is a lot of fun!

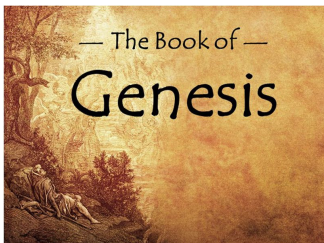

On **October 11 at 7:00 p.m.**, we will discuss Genesis, chapters 9-11.

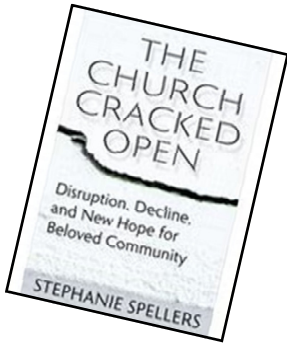
On **October 25 at 7:00 p.m.**, we will discuss Genesis, chapters 12-16

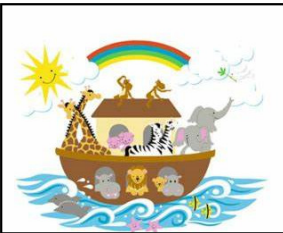

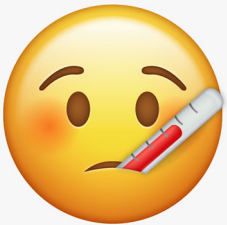

Safety during Respiratory Infection Season

Last fall we had three major circulating viruses in our community, Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV), Covid and Influenza. We had several measures in place to keep Trinity safe and had no known spread that we know of.

Several reminders on what we need to do this year!

- Wash your hands---Trinity has hand sanitizer stations around the narthex and fellowship hall for all to use (this is effective in mitigating the spread of infections) seems simple, but really necessary.
- Stay home if you are not feeling well-this protects you and us.
- Wear a mask if you want, it is always ok.
- Ask your medical provider/public health department about the vaccines that we have to protect us from all of these viruses. RSV is new this year, Covid and Flu are new for the strains that are predicted to be in the community, The Covid and Flu updated doses will continue to be needed to keep us safe.

To The People of God at Trinity Episcopal Church,
Wauwatosa, Wisconsin:

Since Sunday, 24 September marks my last day in service to you as your organist and choir director, I want to take just a moment to thank you for having had the opportunity to pray with you and to provide the music that takes worship beyond mere speech. I was so pleased last June when Pastor Manning asked if I were available to take on the musical duties of the parish for the months of July, August, and September. Having subbed for Tom Koester occasionally in the past, and having known Gary from the days when I was Director of Music at St. Paul's in Milwaukee, I was happy to accept the temporary position. It was also something of a minor homecoming since I grew up on Jackson Park Boulevard and 81st Street. Little did I know how quickly these three months would fly by!

I think parishes aren't often enough aware of the impressions they make upon visitors. The culture of a particular parish goes a very long way, I think, in determining how effective the place is in evangelizing — that is, bringing a stranger into the family of Christ here and now. A parish “vibe” is usually quite invisible to the people who live deep inside it week after week, so let me give you a quick snapshot of what it's been like for me and some of my musician friends to be among you.

Disasters in Morocco and Libya

On September 8, a devastating 6.8-magnitude earthquake struck Morocco, killing almost 3,000 people, with the number of deceased persons still growing. Episcopal Relief & Development is partnering with the International Blue Crescent Relief and Development Foundation to provide relief to over 10,000 survivors of the disaster.

Days later, heavy rains caused deadly flooding across eastern Libya. The floods overwhelmed two dams, sending a wall of water through the center of the city of Derna, destroying entire neighborhoods and sweeping people out to sea. Estimates are more than 11,000 have been killed.

A Word About Trinity's Banners

It's been 10 years since the first set of banners made their appearance in Trinity's worship space. We have many lovely pieces of art in the nave, not the least of which are our glorious stained glass windows, but it had been some time since anything new had been added.

A small group of interested parishioners and the rector began looking for an artist and had the good fortune to find Marilyn Dale, a Chicago area artist with experience working with churches. The project was able to move forward thanks to a bequest from the Arvedson family, in memory of the Rev. Peter Arvedson, PHD, S.O. SC.



Sacred art is meant to inspire awe or reverence among believers and has historically been representational, whereas our banners clearly fall into the abstract category. Abstract art does not attempt to represent external reality, but instead seeks to have the viewer bring in their own interpretations of the meaning, or evoke a *feeling* as people explore what they see with their minds rather than with their eyes. This requires what is commonly referred to as a "slow look". Spending time with the art and allowing the eyes to move around the piece(s).

The first banners were a pair created for Lent. They had to be modified from the original design to work well in the altar area, but we were so happy with them that we commissioned Marilyn do a second set for Ordinary time, or the "Green season", (also in Peter Arvedson's memory.) This is the longest season in the church calendar, extending from Pentecost to Advent, so we requested multiples banners. The idea was to introduce them at different times and places in the church. These are the banners which we see now.



When I look at them here is what comes to mind: the large sweeps of soft green make me feel peaceful, as in the pastures of Psalm 23; the purple, grapes or wine, or perhaps royalty; the blue, the waters of baptism; the irregular dark lines suggest vines and branches. You may feel something entirely different as your eyes move through the various pieces, and that is the point.

Our most recent addition is the set of glorious Easter banners, introduced in Easter of 2021 through a bequest from Barb Hagon, in remembrance of her husband and beloved parishioner Michael Hagon. I can't look upon these banners without feeling that Marilyn was filled with the holy spirit as she put her brush to canvas. By now she knew our space intimately, and hit another home run.



I can't help wondering what Advent banners might look like!
