Dear Friends:

In the June edition of *Tidings*, I wrote an extensive article detailing my desire that as many Trinity parishioners as possible would, over the course of the summer, read the book, *The Church Cracked Open: Disruption, Decline, and New Hope for Beloved Community*. I am grateful for the witness and commitment of our Anti-Racism Study Group which has now been meeting for an entire year. This cadre of your fellow parishioners is whole-heartedly committed to being a resource group for our congregation as we seek to understand the often untold history of our nation's (and our denomination's) creation of, participation in, and perpetuation of a culture of inhumanity, inequity and injustice. I am grateful for this group's tenacity and persistence in gently confronting us with realities so easily overlooked and ignored from our comfortable corner in Wauwatosa.

In August, we held our first conversations to discuss chapters 1-3 of Spellers' book. Those conversations were well-organized and

thought provoking. The Anti-Racism Study Group did the heavy lifting of preparation so that the conversation could seemingly flow effortlessly. The only thing that could have made those evenings more compelling is if we had been joined by more of our fellow parishioners.

I understand that people's lives are busy and calendars are packed. I understand that the sorts of conversations a book like this will provoke will be awkward, uncomfortable, and emotional. I

understand that we can, because of our particular privilege as a mostly white, suburban congregation, offer any number of plausible reasons why this particular discussion at this particular time is inconvenient.

Through the years, I've done my best to refrain from over-using any perceived authority I have as your rector to push the congregation in this or that direction. But friends, this work of figuring out how Trinity Church is being called to be ministers of reconciliation in the most racially segregated metropolitan area in our country is fundamental to who we claim to be as a Christian congregation. While we are statistically insignificant (400 souls in a metro area of over 1.5 million residents), this does not alleviate our Baptismal responsibility to "seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbor as ourselves," and to "strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being." (BCP, p. 303)



We will be meeting approximately every other week to read and study the book of Genesis together. Because of the length of this particular biblical text (50 chapters!), it will be our focus from September through February.


There will be two sessions in September:



Rest in Peace and Rise in Glory!

Earlier this summer, Trinity Church lost one of our quiet and faithful parishioners, Sammie Lou Krieger. Sammie Lou died just a few days ahead of her ninetieth birthday, though some of her friends and extended family had already conducted a proper celebration with her a couple of weeks before her death (the photo accompanying this article was taken at Sammie Lou's party!).

While she had been unable to attend Sunday worship for some time because of her health, Sammie Lou was committed to Trinity and her parish community. During her time as a parishioner, Sammie Lou participated in all aspects of parish life, but she was especially fond of her Women's Guild friends, and did her best to never miss a meeting!

One part of Sammie Lou's life that many folks may not know is that, through the years, she housed dozens of medical students from all over the world while they completed their studies at the Medical College of Wisconsin. She labored tirelessly to make sure the students she hosted weren't simply "boarders," but that they were part of a home with a "family feel." The fact so many of her "kids" kept in touch with her long after their graduation is witness to the ways in which hospitality wasn't simply a word for Sammie Lou, but that it was her ministry.

Sammie Lou's ashes were interred in the Trinity Church Columbarium (located in the Chapel of the Ascension) in a quiet Committal Liturgy on July 14, 2023. During that liturgy, those of us gathered gave thanks for a life well-lived -- a life full of faith, hope, and love. Recently, we have learned that Sammie Lou's generosity of spirit and commitment to this parish community will be reflected in a bequest from her estate. Thoughtful to the end, Sammie Lou's generous gift will continue to support the ministry of this parish which she loved so much.

O God, whose mercies cannot be numbered: Accept our prayers on behalf of your servant, Sammie Lou, and grant her an entrance into the land of light and joy, in the fellowship of your saints; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.



Prayer List Coordinator

Recently, Gary Manning reconvened the Trinity Caregivers, which through the years has functioned as a pastoral care support team supplementing the ministry of the rector in many practical ways, such as: arranging meals for those recently home from the hospital or dealing with extended illness; sending cards to parishioners who are experiencing illness, life transition, etc.; coordinating funeral receptions; and much more. One key aspect of the Caregivers ministry had been the upkeep and coordination of the Parish Prayer List.

Because parishioners' privacy is of utmost importance, names which appear in the Sunday bulletin and which are read aloud during the liturgy simply list first names without any other identifying information. Prior to the pandemic, the Prayer List Coordinator kept a more detailed log of who we were praying for, what we were praying for, and how long that person had been on the list. In the past, our practice was to put a name on the prayer list for six weeks, and then follow up to see if they needed to remain on the list for another six weeks. Our goal is to be attentive to folks requesting our prayers, while simultaneously working to keep the list from growing unmanageable.

For some time now, the task of receiving prayer requests has, by default, been handled from the parish office, and requests can still be submitted there, but we are delighted to announce that longtime Trinity parishioner, Jessie Bulgrin, has agreed to serve as our new Prayer List Coordinator. School Supplies Delivered!!

Forty two backpacks filled with school supplies were delivered to Sojourner Family Peace Center on August 21st!

Eight empty backpacks were also sent along for filling with supplies that the domestic violence shelter had already received.

Sojourner also received half of the proceeds of our summer rummage sale, so you might be interested in knowing a bit about the services they provide to children.

Children accompany their mothers while they are staying at the shelter, seeking justice and utilizing the programs offered to get their lives back on track. Services specifically for children include:

- Child Witness to Domestic Violence this is a support group for parents and children where topics of relationships, safety, strengthening family, etc are discussed at age-appropriate levels.
- Teen Group speaking about healthy relationships
- Drop-in childcare for children whose parent is receiving services at Sojourner.
- Camp Hope year-round program culminating in a oneweek camp during the summer. It is the only camp in the state to focus specifically on children who have experienced domestic violence.
- Partners on-site which offer services for children include Children's Wisconsin which offers counseling, and Milwaukee Public Schools, which helps with school-related needs such as enrollment, transportation and more.

A huge thank you to Kathy Longeway, Jill and Paul Paradowski and everyone who contributed supplies to make a difference to children who are caught up in difficult and distressing circumstances.
